The Time the Magister's Dad Pledged Sigma Chi

During the fall of 1946, I was the chapter Magister. One evening in September or October, I was in the Chapter Room waiting for the pledges to assemble for a pledge meeting. To my surprise, my father (Edmund F. Preece) walked in, and opened his suit coat so I could see the pledge pin on his vest.

I asked him, "Where did you get that?"

He replied, "Two Sigma Chis pinned it on and told me to report to you."

I had a good idea what had happened. I didn't need to ask any more questions.

My father was not a stranger on the Maryland campus. He was a civil engineer working for the Army Engineer Corps. His office was in Washington, but he also spent time at a soil testing facility that he had established on campus early in WWII when he was updating the Army Engineers' Field Manual. That September, he had started auditing a course in the Chemistry Department to help him with some of his research. Two of my fraternity brothers must have spotted him sitting in a classroom and decided that established him as a student.

At the next chapter meeting, he was sent a written invitation to become a member of Sigma Chi Fraternity. We initiated Dad on November 10, 1946. A few weeks later, he was elected President of the Gamma Chi Alumni Chapter.

Better Late than Never By Richard Kearns '77

When I first enrolled at the University of Maryland, housing was very tight. I ended up taking a room in the Lambda Chi Alpha house

on Fraternity Row. By the time I arrived on campus, they had their charter revoked and the house was taken over by D.U.

They allowed me to stay and also participate in the intramural leagues. I first met Tim Francis on the soccer fields when Sigma Chi played D.U. I believe I scored 2 goals that day. After the game, Tim approached me about pledging Sigma Chi. That night, I met him at the old house and also met a number of brothers, and I knew right away Sigma Chi was for me.

I studied my pledge material intensely. I didn't want anything to happen that may cause me not to be initiated. At the end of the semester, my junior year, things changed.

Back in those days the job market was extremely tight. My father was a VP with a very large insurance company and he advised me that there was a management level position available and that it reported to one of his

counterparts who had agreed to offer me the position. It was clear that the decision had already been made for me.

I remember my family was gathered for a holiday dinner when the phone rang. It was David Crow, my Magister. He was wondering where I was because I was supposed to be at the house for initiation. I told him what happened and that I would not be going back to school. He begged me

to come anyway and go through initiation.

I was so distraught that I wasn't going back, so I declined.

I remember his words to this day: "Rich, if you don't come down and go through initiation, you will regret it for the rest of your life."

He was right. Not a week went by when I didn't regret my decision to stay home.

Then, something happened that made me explore the possibility of making the dream come true.

Nearly 40 years later, my nephew who attends James Madison came to me and said "Uncle Rich, I often heard you speak of Sigma Chi, and I want you to know I'm pledging Sigma Chi right now."

I was so proud. I decided there must be something I could do. I called headquarters and explained my situation. They put me in touch with Scott Werber, and I also contacted David Crow. These two great brothers put the wheels in motion to make my dream come true.

At the age of 60, I became a brother of Sigma Chi, Gamma Chi chapter!

P.S. One month later, I had the opportunity to attend my nephew's initiation and participate in the process.

Christian Kachel '03 Releases Second Novel in a Series

Alum Author Shares the Story Behind His New Book

U.S. Army Reserve Major and award-winning author **Christian Kachel '03** recently celebrated the release of his new book, *Spoils of Olympus II: World on Fire.* This is the second book in the Spoils of Olympus series. Inspired by his experiences in Sigma Chi and fueled by his passion for ancient history, the story revolves around the events following the death of Alexander the Great.

About His Sigma Chi Experience

Q: Why did you join Sigma Chi as an undergrad?

A: A number of my friends had joined the year prior, and Sigma Chi at UMD in 2000–2001 was a bit different than the 'normal' fraternities on Frat Row. This fraternity wasn't caught up in the pretentious stuff and had a strong history and bond between brothers.

Q: What is your favorite memory of Sigma Chi?

A: I think traveling down to Miami for the 2002 Orange Bowl and New Year's Eve was probably my favorite Sigma Chi experience.

Q: Do you still keep in touch with many brothers?

A: There is a strong group of about 30 of us from the late '90s and early 2000s that keep in contact fairly regularly, given how far removed we are from graduating. Annual tailgates and 'man trips' always draw a good showing.

About His Novels

Q: How did your experiences in Greek life influence your future as an author?

A: Well, putting the coincidence that my novels take place in the ancient Greek world aside, my experiences and bonds formed during great times and bad—mostly great—while at Sigma Chi certainly translate to the core group of young male characters in my books.

Q: What has fueled your passion for ancient history?

A: I've always had a love of history and read many historical novels

prior to ever thinking of writing my own. Because of my familiarity with the literary genre, I knew the specific time period covered in my novels was not heavily written about. I saw an opportunity to write an interesting story about a unique time period—the time immediately following the death of Alexander the Great where his many generals fought over what he left behind. Greek and foreign armies were drawn into a world war that spanned decades and three continents.

Q: Why did you decide to write historical narratives about the Macedonian Empire?

A: Much had been written about Alexander the Great, both fiction and non-fiction, but few novels have been written about the incredible time period following his death. He established the greatest land empire up to that period which was fought over and divided among his generals for over 250 years.

Q: I see you have a new book that came out in 2016, can you tell me about it?

A: The sequel to my debut novel, *Spoils of Olympus II: World on Fire*, picks up right where the first leaves off. It expands the story further into the palaces of Babylon and the ancient cities of Persia.

Q: What do you hope readers will take away from reading Spoils of Olympus II: World on Fire?

A: It is my hope that readers will first and foremost appreciate the success Alexander and his later successors had throughout the Mediterranean world and beyond. Greek Kings were still in power over 100 years later in places as disparate as Egypt and Afghanistan.

I also think we as people have gotten a little too comfortable with the ease provided us through technology and hope readers will have a newfound respect for the lives of our ancestors.
